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Empowering patients - the role of patient decisions aids in choosing care

Coronary artery disease is a huge problem in the UK and is one of the leading causes of death. There are many treatment options available to patients but navigating the complexity of choice can be overwhelming. Patient decision aids are designed to help patients make a treatment choice which is right for them. A review team, led by Emma Harris, approached the library and asked us provide a series of complex searches, formulated with liaison with her team, to inform a systematic review and meta-analysis which was eventually published in the European Journal of Cardiovascular Nursing
